


MAKING SPACE FOR NATURE

The wildflower areas in School Lane and around the edges of the playing fields were mown some time ago, as a late-mown hay meadow would be. We are doing the same thing in the wildflower areas in St Mary's Churchyard, with a strimmer

then a mower. A good amount of yellow rattle seed was collected from School Lane and the churchyard during the summer and this has been dried and sorted and has been sown along the edges of the playing field to help suppress the grass there.

On 3rd November Mike Pollard from Banbury Ornithological Society gave a talk on Farmland Birds, which was very well attended, and there were some excellent questions. We have continued to meet with wildlife enthusiasts from nearby villages and our network — South Warwickshire Area Network (SWAN) for Wildlife is developing well. We assisted the Shipston team with some of their events during Great Big Green Week at the end of September.

MY GRANDPARENTS' WAR



In the last issue of the Record we invited readers to send in details of their own 'Grandparents' War'. Brian Temple Brown has responded to our request with a fascinating story about his grandfather in the First World War.

My grandfather served with the Prince of Wales Volunteers with the rank of 1st lieutenant. During the first year of the First World War, 1914/1915, his job was to locate, and be responsible for training, horses for 'War Duty'. He was a keen horse-man before the war. His job was a bit like that part in the film 'War Horse'.

Over on the Continent, he was in charge of a section of Chinese troops. Initially, they were responsible for seeing to it that the horses were being correctly used. Once he and his contingent of Chinese troops were well established, they spent the rest of the war operating at night, supplying the front lines with ammunition and food, both in France and Belgium.



Grandpa Fairlie is wearing a white neckerchief in the centre of the photo, pictured alongside his Chinese troops.

My Grandfather was one of the few officers to survive the whole of the war. He was injured and repatriated to England during the last 3 months of the war. I remember my Grandfather very well. After the Second World War, I grew to love him and respect him tremendously. He taught me a lot when I was a lad.

THE THIRD BATTLE OF NEWBURY

This month the WI enjoyed an informative and often amusing talk by Mervyn Edwards who was the Operational Police Commander for all aspects of the policing of the Newbury Bypass which took place between 1995 and 1998. The operation took three years to complete. He called his talk, 'The Third Battle of Newbury." For History buffs the first and second battles were fought in the English Civil War the last being in 1644.

The talk covered his background career in an effort to put into context the reason he was chosen for this quite unique and complex police operation. The talk also included references to protesters who were living in the trees and tunnels. We were shown photographs of these tree houses, tunnels and camps.

Mervyn also demonstrated the use of items used by protesters in an effort to prevent the road being built: 'lock ons' or 'dragons'. A 'sleeping dragon' involves protesters putting their limbs through pipes embedded in concrete, or a mixture of steel and concrete, and often show great imagination by those making the lock-on. The protester can choose between a type that will allow them to willingly remove themselves or a type that requires machinery to remove them.

Our speaker told the story of the building of the controversial new road at Newbury and described some of the other obstacles to its completion, for example Desmoulin's whorl snail which famously delayed the construction of the bypass. Following a lengthy mollusc related legal battle, the protected, pin-head sized snails were moved out of the way of the road....at some great cost.

To this day, Mervyn enjoys a drive on the Newbury Bypass which he has a strong affinity to...even a sense of ownership.

Despite the awful weather we had yet another good turn out for our last meeting at the school and now look forward to our Christmas Social on the 7th December back in the Village Hall.


TYSOE PARISH CLERK'S UPDATE



Hello Tysoe,

Autumn is now upon us which means the Parish Council's thoughts turn to the budget for next year. Over the next month or so we will be looking at our expenditure on the essential services; mowing, street lighting, playground maintenance etc. to see how we can contain costs in the coming year. Although our precept is only a very small component of residents' Council Tax we will strive to control costs. We have taken up residents' concerns about the disruption and inconvenience caused by the work being carried out to install fibre broadband. No warning or explanation was provided and Warwickshire County Council seem to have renounced any responsibility even though they are responsible for roads and verges. We hope to get some explanation in the coming days.

What has occupied a huge amount of time has been the application by Acorn Bioenergy to build a large anaerobic digester in the parish. At the time of writing there are nearly 1,000 objections on the District Council's website and when you read this you may still have time to submit yours if you have not already done so. The proposed digester is a huge industrial gas production facility sited in open countryside and in full view of the Cotswold AONB. This facility (each tower equates to the height of 4 double-deck buses), will be a blight on the landscape and will cause a huge amount of incremental heavy traffic.



It will be totally alien in one of the finest views in Warwickshire.



Although promoted as a "green" source of energy the digester will be very far from The green. CO₂ emissions, both from the process itself and from the traffic causes, will negate any green credentials that Acorn claim for it.

The photo above gives an idea of the scale of the traffic disruption likely to happen as the feedstock for the digester is delivered from farms as far away as 16km along the narrow lanes connecting the villages in the vicinity of the digester. This industrial facility has no place in this beautiful and unspoilt landscape and the damage it would do would be irreparable and permanent. APPLE DAY AT THE ORCHARD

What a crop of apples and pears this year! A bumper

harvest even though most of the apples are a little smaller than usual. They are however very juicy and with good flavour despite the long dry and sunny summer and completely delicious.



The first commercial juicing produced over 100 bottles of pasteurised juice with a good balanced flavour – the second batch which was been sent off produced 170 bottles which is expected to be even better with more varieties in the mix. To pasteurise it ourselves is a long and hard business as we have to use small equipment and the effort is very great so using a commercial operation is wonderful and much appreciated by our members!

The signs of autumn are all around the orchard as the perry pear trees drop their fruit and the dessert pears leaves are turning a beautiful colour! But still plenty of apples stored and the last few are hanging on the trees along with medlars and a few quince.





TYSOE'S UNIQUE WESTMINSTER QUARTERS

A quick update regarding the unique version of the Westminster Quarters (as reported in August) which sound from the church clock...

The annual service of the clock has just been completed. We had hoped that the Cumbria Clock Company would be able to unscramble the order of the chimes. However, this has proved not to be possible! That is the way the clock, a very early example of a Smith's of Derby turret clock, was built in 1877. The chime barrel can be seen in the photograph and clearly shows the cams that have been fixed in position to drive the four chime hammers.



It is understood that the designers had to avoid any repeated notes as that would have required an additional hammer – later versions of the Smith's clock had two hammers for any repeated notes. Therefore, we have a modified version of the Westminster Quarters which can be chimed without repetition of a single note. We will have to live with the Tysoe variant!

We should also record our thanks to the Parish Council for their generous donation of £200 towards the cost of the maintenance work.
