


BOB'S 96TH BIRTHDAY PARTY

A KNIGHT, TO REMEMBER



Tysoe WI is becoming used to entertaining Time Travellers...at May's meeting we met Sir Francis Tresham, a Medieval Knight and supporter of the Lancastrian cause who was assisted by his long suffering Squire.

Sir Francis was well aware that nearby Warwick was a Yorkist stronghold held by the kingmaker, Sir Richard Neville ...but we assured him that Tysoe WI would keep him safe for the duration of his visit.

Sir Francis took us through the steps of getting ready to go into battle. This involved removing his everyday outfit so that he could don his armour. He was kind enough to pass round examples of his clothing for us to examine including his linen underwear (not the ones he was wearing at the time).

His Squire clothed Sir Francis in his suit of mail which included separate mail "shorts" worn on top of woollen hose. Altogether 70lbs of steel armour were attached to Sir Francis' body with leather straps.

It was a perfect fit as the armour had been made to his exact measurements...again we were invited to try on his gauntlets (surprisingly flexible) and several of the helmets he had with him, (unsurprisingly heavy).

Many questions were asked from the obvious "how do you go to the toilet in armour" to "why was a knight's sword blunt not razor sharp"?

It felt appropriate to have had a visit from a knight of the Realm only days before the Coronation of King Charles III.



MAKING SPACE FOR NATURE



There is a continuing worrying decline in biodiversity, most recently highlighted for birds - the British Trust for Ornithology estimates that Britain has lost 73 million birds over the last 50 years. The decline is attributed to habitat loss and also to fragmentation, where particular habitats are broken up into smaller isolated blocks, making it difficult for species to move around, breed and survive. In the context of the protection and re-creation of habitats, people talk about habitat networks, which are intended to link and expand habitats to increase 'connectivity' and sustain greater biodiversity. We're doing this on a small scale in Tysoe, by not mowing verges and practicing 'No Mow May', making more wildlife habitats available and increasing the connectivity between habitats.

There is however, the opportunity to do more, and on a greater scale, and this is where 'human networks' come in. These can facilitate the exchange of information and good practice and underpin projects to support biodiversity at a landscape scale. Currently in south Warwickshire there are three such networks. Firstly, an expanding group of wildlife friendly communities, including Tysoe, have developed a network called SWAN (South Warwickshire Area Network for Wildlife). We meet regularly, exchange ideas and share events. SWAN is complementary to the developing South Feldon Eco Church network led by Reverend Parbury, itself part of a larger Finally, the Warwickshire Rural Hub, network in the Diocese. Warwickshire Wildlife Trust and Severn Rivers Trust have launched three sustainable farming groups, including a new group for south Warwickshire. These bring together like-minded farmers to share best practice on how to improve their farm for wildlife whilst maintaining a changes productive farm. The implemented bv the Government's new Environment Bill mean that these networks are likely to have an increasing role locally and may have more opportunities to collaborate.



DOWN ON THE FARM - HERBERTS FARM



Always busy, busy at Herberts Farm but May to December gets truly hectic. The last cow calved mid May, while just two stragglers are due in July, both old girls so they should be OK going solo. After a handy dry spell in February where we got ahead on the ploughing, a very wet cold spring hampered fodder beet drilling. However, come April 1st evaporation starts to exceed *transpiration, and sure enough the ground did start to dry out, evaporation averaged approximately 1-1.5mm/day as it slowly warmed up. At the time of writing, 19th May, the beet seed finally left the dining room floor and was drilled into a not-too-bad seedbed in the end. Fingers crossed for a few warm showers, no slugs and no flea beetle so it gets a good start! I've gone 100% Blaze variety this year. It's an older variety but it does well on this ground and the cattle prefer it to the white skinned varieties.

COTSWOLDS AONB PATHS UPDATE

Another month, another bridge! Many of you may have noticed the new footpath bridge on the Oxhill road, just this side of the turning to Thomas Fox and Kirby Farm. Warwickshire County Council wanted to reinstate a long-lost footpath SS36b across three fields, over to the little bridge across the stream near Oxhill church; the working party from Cotswolds National Landscape, the organising body for the Cotswolds AONB, carried out the work in April.

We also replaced a series of yellow-topped footpath posts on the path SS35 near Oxhill. This means the walk across the fields from Lower Tysoe to Oxhill is much easier to follow, although some of the older waymark signs still need replacing. Both works were carried out in conjunction with the landowner, Mr Percy Sewell of Burland House, to encourage walkers to stay on the official path into his farmyard.


If you see waymark signs that might benefit from being replaced, or if you are a landowner who would like guidance on how to access funding to help you repair stiles and gates please get in touch.

TYSOE FOLK - MISS JUNE BALL

The Tysoe Record is launching a new feature about local characters. There are some wonderful stories to tell. We are very grateful to Phil Walker for writing about these individuals who each had their own outlook on life and ways of living. The first in the series is about Miss June Ball whom some of the older residents may remember.



Leaving Lower Tysoe towards Kineton the road passes Tysoe Vale Farm on the left just before the crossroads.

As a small boy (60 odd years ago) I accompanied my father to buy young chickens (pullets) from the lady who lived there. On ringing a bell, a figure (Miss June Ball) would appear from a barn. She was almost doubled up as she walked and was dressed in a long brown smock tied with string. Her two grey pigtails almost reached her waist. Straw festooned her hair and smock.

THE AUTOBIOGRAPHY OF JUNE BALL Born into a wealthy family, as a child she was given a pony which fuelled her love of the countryside and her desire to run her own farm. Her father owned Ball Bros Engineers in Strat-ford and the family moved to a huge Tudor style residence on the Banbury Road in Stratford.

Well educated and well spoken but immensely practical she relinquished her luxurious childhood upbringing to live a hard rustic life, purchasing and developing Tysoe Vale. She had a house built which she sometimes rented out. She preferred to sleep in a small caravan or a barn. She avoided solid food, and is said to have existed on milk, honey and sugar.

She regularly drove to Stratford Market on her tractor and on one occasion after having seriously cut her finger drove to A & E again on her tractor. She had a pony and trap in which she'd travel to local shows and exhibitions – it was probably the only time she dressed up!

Hard working and devoted to Tysoe Vale, she was a real character in the village and it is reported that in her will, she left her smallholding to a charity for under privileged children so that they too could experience the country life that she so treasured.
