THE ARTS IN TYSOE 🦠



Participating in any of the arts, such as painting, pottery, writing, poetry, story-telling, drama, singing, dancing or playing an instrument increases our social connections, deepens our relationships, keeps our minds sharp and reinforces our feelings of belonging. It gives meaning to our lives and helps us appreciate our world and have a deeper understanding of our emotions.

We are very lucky in Tysoe to have so many galleries, theatres and historic houses within our area to inspire us. How can we use this inspiration, no matter our age, and feel fulfilled by it? Some of you may already belong to choirs, Am Dram groups or attend art classes, but what about those of us who feel insecure about our ability and need motivation?

Painting and photography can help with stress and anxiety and feelings of isolation, enabling the mind to focus on the world outside of ourselves and letting it into our hearts and minds.

A suggestion: buy yourself a note book that has both plain and lined paper. This is your private book of inspiration. Make a list of the things you would like to do or take part in. Then make time to walk up to the woods, looking at the fields, the trees, the plants and the sky as you go. Listen to the birds and smell the air. When you've gone far enough, find somewhere to sit and jot down everything you remember in detail. You might even make a quick sketch of where you are. When you get home, read what you've written and think about how you felt - then try to connect the words and the emotions. This might be your first poem or an idea for a short story. Who knows you might be following in the footsteps of Tysoe's most famous author, Joseph Ashby (1859-1919), an agricultural trade unionist, rumoured to be the illegitimate son of the Marquis of Northampton. See Wikipedia.

There is so much music, singing, dancing and drama that Tysoe has to offer but if it's not to your taste then think about getting a group of friends together and starting something new, whatever your age. My last word of advice, the arts for us amateurs is about play and having fun and getting rid of that inner critic.

'LIFE IS A MASKERADE' -INTERVIEW WITH BEN KFYSER



Ben Keyser is 24 years old, turning 25 just after Christmas. He is a Tysoe resident. You may have seen him play Richard Hannay in Kineton Amateur Dramatics Society (KADS) much-applauded production of 'The 39 Steps' earlier this year (see photo above). He's just directed Maskerade, their latest production.

- **Q. When did you first become interested in acting? A.** I've always been a Drama Queen, hooked from my first nativity play.
- **Q. You're young to be a director, aren't you?** A. I was asked if I'd like to direct about Feb/March time. KADS is a fun group to work with. Everyone is very honest; they're not being paid to perform but are there for the love of it. After such a demanding role as Richard Hannay, it's good to step back and let someone else grab the limelight.
- **Q. What attracted you to this play?** A. I scanned lots of scripts. I read this one and laughed my socks off. This play is a great introduction to the world of Terry Pratchett.
- **Q. What's been most challenging? A.** Every rehearsal has been great fun. The challenge is making sure the people in charge of props and costumes don't start crying because there are over 26 characters and *so many props!*
- **Q. Any special highlights? A.** Anton Lesser is now a patron of KADS. He's come along to a couple of rehearsals and helped paint the set. I can't wait to get him along to watch the final show after seeing it in development.
- **Q.** How do you intend to follow this production? A. I auditioned for a role in the Bearpit theatre, Stratford. We're going to be performing 'An Evening of Tom Stoppard' two short plays in February 2024. I have a major role in 'The Real Inspector Hound' and a supporting role in the second.



A REVERSE ADVENT CALENDAR INVITATION

Last year seems to have raced by. I am thinking about the liturgical year, as our new church year begins on the first day of Advent, which will be 3rd December 2023. You may perhaps have started opening the doors on your Advent Calendar on 1st December?

This year we are inviting everyone to get involved in the "Reverse Advent Calendar" scheme. The idea is that each household or individual has a box, or something similar, and places an item of food in it every day of Advent. (An alternative is to place these items directly in the box in the church porch.) By Christmas Eve there will be 24 items of food in each box, for the Foodbank to distribute to people in need. This Christmas there are lots of people in need, especially with the cost of food and heating etc. going up and up. For many, even the everyday items are out of reach, never mind the luxuries most of us look forward to over Christmas

Thousands in our world are struggling to survive in areas torn apart by wars or devastated by natural disasters. Others are facing starvation due to the failure of their crops because of climate change. When we celebrate Christmas, it is rightly a time of joy and rejoicing: the Saviour of the world was born! 

TYSOE WALLED KITCHEN GARDEN



In December it will be 15 years since we moved to Tysoe and we have spent that time renovating the cottage and the walled garden, previously part of Tysoe Manor. The garden has now "settled in" although ever-changing, as gardens do, be it by planting or a new project.

The aim when we moved here was to create a space for growing a wide range of fruit and vegetables, still keeping an attractive walled environment including trees, shrubs and flowers alongside the vegetables. In 2015 we opened our garden, along with others in the village for the NGS (National Garden Scheme) and continue to do so. We will be opening on July 6th and 7th 2024.

We produce many basic crops, potatoes, onions, apples, strawberries, but also experiment with more unusual crops, some never to be repeated! Yard long bean (interesting but not a nice taste); chick peas that taste lovely when fresh (nothing like the tinned or dried ones) but they have one pea per pod with a spike!

There is far more produce that we can use, although a friend recently said that we have more vegetables at one meal than they do in a whole week! Family and friends get a fair amount of what we produce. Our freezers and stores are full and we sell the rest from the trolley at the bottom of the drive. Organically grown and picked at the optimum time for best flavour, what's not to like? Plants too.

In January each year we add up the money we have raised and decide which local groups and charities we want to share the money with. Last year we gave money to: Tysoe Dementia cafe, NGS (National Garden Scheme, medical charities), Dogs for Good - Banbury, Shipston Food Bank and Tysoe CE Primary School for outdoor resources and provisions.



On the evening of December 13th 1873 six families including children from Tysoe met at the Old Tree to say farewell to friends and relatives. The following day they travelled to Banbury, then by train to Plymouth to board the Scimitar, a sailing ship that would take them to a new life in New Zealand. There were 36 of them in all – the Tysoe 36.

On the evening of December 13th 2023, exactly 150 years to the day, the Tysoe Heritage Research Group (THRG) will be commemorating the event with a presentation in the Village Hall. Who were these families? Why did they choose to leave Tysoe? How was life on the ship during its two-month voyage and what went so catastrophically wrong that the Prime Minister of New Zealand referred to the Scimitar as 'a floating pest house' and a local paper described the emigrants as 'the sweepings of the cities and towns of the old country'?

Using records, sources and letters, THRG has built up a picture of Tysoe in the mid-19th century, the tragic events on the voyage itself and the new lives that the Tysoe 36 made for themselves twelve thousand miles away. There are some fascinating connections, not least being the paintings of Tysoe artist William Matthison found hanging on New Zealand walls, and who would have guessed that a small three-year old from Lower Tysoe would become a world-famous entomologist. . . . Admission free (donations welcome). The Social Club bar will be open.

MAKING SPACE FOR NATURE IN WARWICKSHIRE

According to the recent State of Nature Report 2023 https://stateofnature.org.uk, the UK's wildlife is continuing to decline, including in our region. As a result, the UK is now one of the most nature-depleted countries on Earth.

Around 80 people met at Warwickshire County Council's Northgate House on 13 November to discuss approaches to 'Restoring Nature across Warwickshire, Coventry and Solihull'. The main focus of the day was development of the new Local Nature Recovery Strategy, which is a locally-led plan for growing and recovering nature, and will consist of:

- A map showing the most valuable existing habitats for nature
- A map highlighting specific proposals for creating or improving habitat for nature and wider environmental goals
- Agreement on local priorities for nature's recovery



Warwickshire County Council is leading on the creation of the Nature Recovery Strategy for Warwickshire, together with Local Nature Partnership, of which I'm a Board Member. When completed, the strategy

will become a blueprint for the recovery of nature, showing how and where we can support things like wildflowers, woodlands, wetlands and wider and wilder hedges and edges. The strategies are statutory requirements of the Environment Act. This means that local areas must develop them, and report on the progress of the strategy every three to ten years.

There will be an opportunity to provide input to the plan, as an individual or an organisation, and Tysoe Wildlife and the larger network of town and village groups working for wildlife (South Warwickshire Area Network for Wildlife – SWAN) will be actively engaged. PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

Hi Tysoe,

This week's Parish Council meeting was very much centred around Acorn's Anaerobic Digester planning application. The Parish Council submitted their response to Acorn's amendments, having agreed them at the meeting. Councillors ask all residents if they wish to make comments regarding the application amendments, they should do so either via the planning website or to the planning officer, Joseph Brooke, (Joseph.Brooke@stratford-dc.gov.uk) in writing or via email. The more objections received means the Planning Office will understand that that there are still strong feelings against this proposal.

Our Affordable Homes Committee is working hard to secure land to build more affordable homes in the village. It is hoped that they will be able to meet the needs of those villagers who are looking for homes within Tysoe, at present the Housing Needs Survey shows a requirement for 21 homes of varying sorts. Watch this space for more news—you can also find out further information on the Parish website at www.tysoe.org.uk

Breech Furlong, a piece of land owned by the Parish Council used to help Tysoe's young people in farming, currently has a vacant tenancy. Councillors have been working to find a new tenant and the decision on the tenancy will be made at our December Meeting.

More work is planned on Tysoe's streetlights. I know some of you are aware that some lights are in need of repair and replacement. Unfortunately, response times are slow as parts take time to be made and for the work to be scheduled-in, but they are in progress.

Other planning applications were discussed. Decisions for these can all be seen on the Parish website in the Planning Report.

MEET TYSOE'S NIGHTINGALE - DOREEN SMITH (nee Heritage).

The Heritages were all good singers, music was part of their lives. Doreen always wanted to sing. Mr Farbrother, Tysoe school's new headmaster who joined in 1938, played the piano and organised concerts. Doreen was picked to sing and act which she loved.

As her parents ran the local dance band, Doreen had to go with them to the village hall, as she couldn't stay at home alone (see opposite). She loved singing along. After meeting Jack Friday, an excellent pianist, she spent many happy nights singing at Banbury Town Hall and at gigs nearby, including various Oxford colleges.

In 1946, age 18, she won a 'Crooning Competition' at the Carfax Assembly Rooms in Oxford (trophy above). One of the judges was the editor of 'Melody Maker'. He gave her an excellent write-up which helped to launch her professional career. A job with a Leicester-based band quickly followed, they toured the country by bus. Helen Davies became her stage name. A residency in Nottingham came next, where she sang every night and Saturday afternoons.

In summer the band played at the Wellington Pier, Great Yarmouth where they did some BBC broadcasts. But Doreen found life on the road a bit lonely so when the contract ended she moved back to Tysoe and joined the family business. She still managed to sing with Eddie Turton's band in Oxford and at Upper Heyford 2-3 nights a week, driving herself to the gigs in her Morris 8. In 1956 she married Geoff Smith. The couple started a family seven years later, so her singing career took a back seat for a time.

Doreen has continued to sing throughout her life, latterly with a band called 'Summer Wine.' She recorded a CD in February 2006 in her 78th year which features songs such as: 'The Lady is a Tramp', 'Smile' and 'A Nightingale Sang in Berkley Square.' It is a joy to listen to it and hear Tysoe's very own nightingale singing!

The Editor



During the Second World War the airmen from Shenington aerodrome would visit Tysoe for entertainment and a dance band was formed by Mr Fran Heritage, a local shopkeeper. This was originally called the 'Buskers Band', but was renamed the 'Melody Makers'. The musicians, all local and mostly self-taught, would perform at dances held three times a week. Some of the airmen who could play piano, drums or saxophone would play with the band to earn extra money. The 'Melody Makers' also went to Shenington aerodrome to play as well as to Ratley and Wellesbourne.

The wartime dances in the village hall became very popular. The Saturday dance was called the 'Sixpenny Hop', as it cost sixpence for entry, while the other two dances were known as the 'Sweatbox'. The dances were frequented by a range of groups from the local area, including airmen from Shenington, the Women's Auxiliary Air Force (WAFS), the young women from the land army who were stationed at Idlicote, soldiers from the Central Ammunition Depot in Kineton, and members of the Czech Free Army who would cycle from Kineton. A resident described how fights would sometimes break out between soldiers from Kineton and airmen from Shenington.

The Shenington airmen, who came from America, Canada and Australia as well as from Britain, were seen as a great attraction and young women from other villages used to come to Tysoe to meet them. The 'Sixpenny Hop' would end with a 'twilight' waltz during which all lights but one were turned off. One resident remembered how this had caused concern among the older generation and so two well respected female committee members stood in the doorway during the waltz to keep an eye on the couples.
