#### THINK POSITIVE

Tysoe W.I. had the bright idea to invite Jo Small from the Emporium of Positivity to kickstart the New Year. Her talk was about creating a positive mindset. She started by sharing some statistics about NY resolutions. An average of 66% of people make them but only 6% succeed in keeping them for 12 months.

Jo has had a varied career which has seen her deliver life coaching and training from prisons to Executive Boardrooms. Her approach to positivity is not about 'jazz hands' but keeping us steady and anchored. She shared some of her Mindfulness techniques. We are all creatures of habit she told us, but we need to stop relying on autopilot and be more aware of what's around us, an example would be to simply wear our watch on the other wrist or put our coat on using the other arm to our usual one.

Jo guided us in an exercise called 3-2-1 where we had to actively listen to 3 sounds, 2 sights and 1 feeling. We followed Jo's lead and listened to our surroundings trying to identify three separate sounds. Most of us heard the hall heating, the chatter from the Social Club and the church bells ringing - all unnoticed before. It was a way of pressing the pause button and checking-in on ourselves.

Another tip was to decide what to put in your suitcase for the year ahead and what to leave behind i.e. regrets. Then decide what to put into your hand luggage so it is always with you. She recommended injecting scent into our lives to bring us joy and not to be too hard on ourselves but speak gently.

Mindfulness and having a positive mindset go a long way to support our enjoyment of life. We all left ready to put Jo's advice into action. As W.I. President Eileen Mann said, "There will be no bananas becoming over ripe in our kitchens...if you want to know the significance of this you must ask Jo!"

Whilst most normal people dream of escaping this dreary, wet winter to warmer climates, overlooking azure beaches and golden sands, we got to head north to the appropriately named country of Iceland, where the seas are grey and the 'sand' is a black volcanic ash. Three weeks of house- and kitty-sitting for my step daughter, while she does indeed escape for some much needed R and R somewhere hot and exotic. At this time of year, it is still pitch black at 10am. In fact, we noticed during our early flight to Iceland that as we left Heathrow and admired the sunrise, the further north we travelled, the darker it became, as the sun struggled to keep up with us.

But even in winter, this bleak country is still beautiful. The mountains are smothered in snow, the glaciers frozen in time. In the small town of Vik, which nestles below rugged cliffs on the south coast, snow buntings busy about, squadrons of grey-lagged geese fly overhead, and fulmars perch on cliff ledges, constantly chattering to each other, awaiting the spring arrival of the puffins.

Here, the tap water is pure, mineral-rich, unfiltered glacier spring water. The country is 100% green energy, from hydro or geothermal power sources (not that it is any cheaper. Nothing is cheap in Iceland!). Bizarrely, Iceland is Europe's largest banana producer, and they are self-sufficient in tomatoes.

But most challenging is pronouncing the names of the volcanoes! In 2010 the Eyjafjallajökull grounded flights around Europe. Just before Christmas, the much awaited Fagradalsfjall finally popped, and now we are anticipating Sundhnúkagígaröð, which could be massive, and any time soon. A prize if you can pronounce any of them!

#### CHURCH MESSAGE

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple (also known as Candlemas) is traditionally celebrated on 2nd February. Luke's Gospel describes two people, Simeon and Anna. Simeon is convinced that he will not die until he has seen the Messiah. Anna is very old, a prophet, who spends all her time in the Temple. They both recognise someone very special in the baby Jesus and Simeon puts it into the words which we know as the Nunc Dimittis, often spoken at funerals: Now, Lord, you let your servant go in peace: your word has been fulfilled. My own eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared in the sight of every people; a light to reveal you to the nations and the glory of your people Israel.

On Saturday 3rd February If you love to sing you are warmly invited to sing and share the Candlemas Eucharist. Rehearsal starts at 3:30 pm: all are welcome to join us for the service at 6:00 pm. This year Ash Wednesday is on 14th February, probably better known as St Valentine's Day. There will be a service at 7:30pm to mark the beginning of Lent.

But before we begin the disciplines of Lent, there is Shrove Tuesday - or Pancake Day - an opportunity to use up all the luxuries which will not be needed. Lent is an important time of year for Christians. It reminds us of when Jesus was in the desert for 40 days without food. It was His time of preparation, getting ready for his work of healing and teaching and sharing the Good News; today we use Lent as a time to focus especially upon the presence of God in our own lives.

During Lent we are encouraged to deepen our lives in faith, to hear God's word more frequently and devote more time to prayer. This year Shipston Deanery is again running Tuesday sessions at 2:30pm entitled "Perspectives on the Cross". Our first session will be led by Bishop Ruth on 20th February at St Mary's Church,

#### **BEWARE! ASIAN HORNET - VESPA VELUTINA**

The Asian Hornet is an invasive non-native species from Asia. It arrived in France 12 years ago and has now spread across Europe. As a highly effective predator of



insects, including honey bees and other beneficial species, it can cause significant losses to bee colonies, other native species and potentially ecosystems. It has been found and destroyed in Tetbury but it is only a matter of time before it is found in other parts of the UK.

#### We must be vigilant!

#### What to look out for

Vespa velutina queens are up to 3 cm in length; workers up to 25 mm slightly smaller than the native European hornet Vespa crabro):

- Entirely dark brown or black velvety body, bordered with a fine yellow band
- Only one band on the abdomen: 4th abdominal segment almost entirely yellow/orange
- Legs brown with yellow ends
- Head black with an orange-yellow face
- Vespa velutina is a day flying species which, unlike the European hornet, ceases activity at dusk

The best way to check if you have seen an Asian Hornet is by using the **Asian Hornet Watch**, a specially designed FREE App, which you can download to your phone. It will help you identify and detect this invasive species by recording suspected sightings.

Do not under any circumstances disturb or provoke an active hornets' nest. The British Beekeepers website has instructions on making traps to catch hornets and now is the time to make and hang them outside in sunny, sheltered locations. #### **WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD**

Despite the winter weather the work at the orchard goes on! There is a new team of volunteers who are responsible for looking after the

fruit trees. They have already had some training on pruning and have started thinning out old and dead branches in the apple trees.

One unusual tree fruit in the orchard is medlars. These look a bit like big rosehips, as my dad put it when we saw them at Upton House! This unlikely looking fruit can be turned into a beautiful, burgundy-coloured jelly which goes perfectly with cheeses and cold meats. The medlars do not ripen on the tree so have to be left to 'blet' first - which basically means 'turned soft and almost rotten'. Then they are cooked, and the juice strained out before being boiled with sugar until it sets.

Membership is open to all for a small fee, and members get fruit every week during the summer and autumn. Some of the apple varieties also keep well over the winter in a cool shed.

#### **WILD BIRDS**

The cold weather, lack of insects, and vanishing seeds and berries, mean that wild birds are getting hungry. These may be residents like the blue tits, great tits, goldfinches. house sparrows and green finches feeding in the Waxwing Richard Ellis Photography



garden, or more exotic winter visitors such as waxwings, which move southwards when their berry supply runs out.

It's also time for the Big Garden Birdwatch (26-28th January) and you can sign up for more information on the RSPB web site. Over half a million people took part in the Big Garden Birdwatch in 2023, counting 9.1 million birds! House sparrows took first place, but their numbers are down by 57% compared with the first Birdwatch in 1979. In fact, we've lost 38 million birds from UK skies in the last 60 years.

There are several reasons for the overall decline in birds, most of them to do with the way we've been using and developing our land. Certain species have also been affected by specific problems. Indeed it's very pleasing to see that greenfinches appear to be making a come-back after a number of years of high mortality due to a parasite-induced disease. It's not clear why greenfinch numbers have increased, and whether this is part of a positive trend. However, to help stop the disease spreading (it won't have gone away completely), please make sure your bird feeders are kept clean.

Outbreaks of bird flu over the last few years have also been catastrophic for certain species of birds and, for example, the Avon swans were badly affected. More recently, certain colonies of sea birds such as kittiwakes, terns and guillemots have been devastated. In contrast to the past few winters, there is no statutory lockdown of poultry at present, although bird flu outbreaks are still being monitored Where an outbreak occurs, disease surveillance and by Defra. control zones are set up, and poultry keepers are required to take certain precautions.



#### **RAIN, RAIN, EVERYWHERE?**

Well we've seen a lot of rain in the last quarter of 2023 and the first few days of 2024. The Avon was at levels last recorded in the 1990s. The RSC cancelled the pantomime performance on January 1st as the Avon burst its banks by the theatre. It seems appropriate (for a number of reasons) to start with a quotation from Twelfth Night:

'When that I was and a little tiny boy, With hey, ho, the wind and the rain, A foolish thing was but a toy, For the rain it raineth every day ...'

Climate change and all that, but let's look at some data before we seek explanations. Our own rainfall records go back only to 2020. The graph shows the final quarter rainfall amounts for each of the last 4 years. Interestingly in the 2020 record a higher 3 monthly rainfall occurred.



It is natural to associate high rainfall and flooding. The news and weather forecasts reinforce this relationship. Nature is more complex than this and the relationship is not linear. Flooding occurs when the groundwater or in our

region the soil moisture reaches saturation. The Environment Agency produces Monthly Water Situation reports. When I look at December 2020, the soil saturation as measured by Soil Moisture Deficit in central England was 2mm. In 2023, from October onwards there was no deficit in our region, the fields were saturated. The Avon at Evesham reached its peak flow in 2023 around 31st October. That bellwether indicator of wetness, the Worcester County Cricket Ground flooded again!

Flooding apart what other effects are noted? As the soil is saturated, nutrients (and large quantities of top soil from winter planted crops) are washed out from the fields surrounding rivers. But that is a topic for another day!



#### You responded - we listened

The Village Hall shared a survey for six weeks between 17th November and 5th January to gain feedback, ideas and opinions from users and potential users of the hall.

Conscious to be inclusive in the survey approach and be accessible to all age groups we placed 140 paper copies of the survey across the hall, Post Office, Village Store & Cafe and The Peacock Inn.

To provide digital participation, multiple posts on Tysoe Village Notice-board and on Oxhill Village Community Facebook pages provided the ability for online completion. We are grateful to Tysoe Primary School and Tysoe Children's Group for sharing details in their parent e-newsletters.

We feel that all village adult age groups were given an opportunity to have their voice. Some feedback from the survey:


- 75 responses were received approximately 6% of Tysoe adult villagers
- 80% responded online

- A wide range of requests for new clubs and groups for which the hall actively seeks owners to take forwards
- Over 60% of respondents wanted an option to book and pay for event tickets online - this is now in place
- Many wished for a single location to understand what is on at the hall
   hopefully between physical noticeboards, Facebook, the new website and email list we cover 95%+ of the village

To those that took the two minutes to respond and help shape the future of the hall, the committee is grateful. We look forward to welcoming visitors old and new to events, clubs and meetings held at this important village amenity.

# TYSOE POST OFFICE AND THE HORIZON SCANDAL

The nation has been rocked by the ITV drama "Mr Bates vs the Post Office" in early January. Although this sorry saga has been going on for over 20 years, since the introduction of the faulty Horizon accounting system, the drama has

galvanised the authorities to do something about accelerating justice for the hundreds of sub-postmasters affected. The Tysoe Record met Jacqueline Franklin who took over as sub-postmistress when her mother Lilian Hopkins died in September 2019, to discover how the scandal had affected her.

Horizon arrived in Tysoe in 2000. The problems revolved around reconciling the monthly balances. Three options were given: 1) To make good any shortfall, 2) To settle centrally, 3) To dispute. Jacqui recalls that Lilian used to look back through the cash and stock to check the figures. There were often discrepancies but rather than dispute, Lilian used to make good the shortfall herself. It seems Lillian didn't keep a record of what she "spent" of her own money making good the alleged shortfalls. Jacqui only has figures from November 2017 to September 2019, in just under 2 years Lilian paid thousands to the Post Office, so heaven knows how much money she paid-in before! You would like to think the Horizon system could answer that question, but nobody is holding their breath.

"She used to get upset," said Jacqui. "She was always supplementing the business from her own pocket." It is sad that Lilian, who served as our sub-postmistress for 42 years, had to endure such injustice. It is evident that her story has been replicated up and down the country, hence the outpouring of public anger. Now that the Government is rushing through new legislation to accelerate the claims process. Jacqui went on to say that they are still having to use Horizon and discrepancies are still occurring, so the saga continues.

# THE MAKING OF TYSOE: GRAVE TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD

This month we shall look at a specifically Christian image on our gravestones, the Cross. This sign would seem to be an obvious

image for Christian burial markers but it was absent from protestant headstones in our area for more than two centuries. The reason was the anathema against "idolatry" and "popish" expressions which accompanied the 16th-century reformation in England, resulting in the wholesale destruction of medieval religious artefacts. Catholics were banned from many walks of life and risked persecution during the period, and the open display of signs of catholic sympathies could be dangerous. This relaxed gradually towards the end of the 18th century, culminating in the passing of the Roman Catholic Relief Act in 1829. This new tolerance coincided with an Anglican religious revival and a renewed enthusiasm for medieval art and architecture which began to value the environment of the "traditional" celebration of

Christian rituals. After centuries of being a virtually invisible sign, within a few decades the cross became an almost ubiquitous grave marker. Our earliest dated churchyard crosses are two on Memorial 407 to Edmund Walker d. 1847, a headstone situated just north west of the tower. The crosses are very discreet, being confined to small decorative roundels as part of the border of the text panel. More prominent are thistles signifying sorrows on earth, and a half-draped urn, which symbolises the promise of eternal life.



There is an earlier memorial displaying a cross inside the church on the wall of the south aisle. It commemorates the Ward family and dates from early 18th century (Memorial 505). The Wards were a prominent catholic family and their interments are marked with a cross, even within the parish church.

# A WARWICKSHIRE LIFE BY FRANK LOMAS

James Francis (Frank) Lomas was born in Tredington in 1890, and moved to the house now known as Chamfered End in Tysoe with his family at about the age of two years.

In later life, he wrote down recollections of his life for his grandson, Alan. Alan says "It is, of course, something that I treasure. His writing offers a glimpse of life in rural Warwickshire during the latter part of



the 19th Century and much of the 20th Century. He was of the generation who fought during World War One and some of his experiences of that time are also included."

Frank's notebooks have now been transcribed and the resulting document, with some additional illustrations, uploaded to the THRG website (https://tysoehistory.org.uk/) – it can be found beneath the Village History menu option. Our thanks must go to Alan for sharing this valuable village resource with us all.
