### TYSOE THEN AND NOW

Michael Gibbs posted the painting featured on the front cover of the Village Facebook page back in February. It provoked a tsunami of comments, all trying to identify its whereabouts. The verdict, given

by Carol Clark, was it's that 'definitely the bottom of Peacock Lane (you can see the blue painted gates to what was then the vicarage). The cottage on the left of the photo was the end dwelling on Vicarage Row.' Pamela Wise then added, 'that was before they straightened the corner and knocked the house down.' While Kay Brooks added, 'My Granny Rainbow lived in one of those cottages.'

Some people expressed regret at the demise of the beautiful thatched cottages but the reality was they were tumbling down and beyond repair. Bryan Nockalls said the residents of the cottages were 'all rehoused en-bloc





in the same order, in the "then" new builds of Middleton Close.' Sue Haines added: 'I lived at no 2 Vicarage Row from birth until 1952 age 4, when Middleton Close was built. The cottages were in a bad state with tarpaulins on the rooftops, problems

with rats. There was no running water so residents had to fetch water from the taps outside the Old Vicarage. My mum must have thought she had died and gone to heaven when she moved us to Middeleton Close with all the mod cons.' ### **DID YOU KNOW?**

The bend at the top of Main Street and the Shipston Road used to be called **Wrighton Corner** (see right) as Compton Wheelwright's Shop used to be there.

Then there was **Faggot Alley** in old Tree Lane, but we're not talk-



ing meat rissoles. Apparently faggots was the term for bundles of kindling wood. According to Kevin Wyles's nan, about 50 yards from where the old tree used to be, there was a communal bread oven where they kept faggots for people to use as fuel for the bread oven.

Badgers Lane in Lower Tysoe, was also known as **Pudding Bag Lane** as it was in the shape of an old fashioned pudding, presumably one which used to be boiled in a cloth.

Lane End, also in Lower Tysoe, used to be called **Fountain Lane** as there used to be a wellhead at the top of the lane.

The track going up from Kevin Welsby's to Old Lodge Farm used to be called **Cow Lane** where the cattle used to walk to be milked.

### TYSOE THEN

The Record asked Michael Gibbs how the village has changed during his lifetime. Born in 1951, he has lived in Tysoe all his life:

**Tysoe dialect or brogue** He recalls a distinctive way of speaking in Tysoe which was different from neighbouring Kineton and Brailes. It is mentioned in Joseph Ashby's book.

**A farming community** Tysoe had over 20 farms when he was a lad. Most had 8-10 cows, some up to 20 which was a fair-sized herd. Blakes Dairy used to collect the churns. He remembers cows being walked through the village and how they made the lanes muddy.

**Elm trees** used to be called 'The Warwickshire weed'. You could find elm saplings in hedgerows and all over. In the 1970s Dutch elm disease hit and in just 10 years, c. 900,000 elm trees died in Warwickshire transforming the landscape.

**Peewits (or lapwings)** Michael remembers how flocks of these birds used to follow the ploughs. Sadly, with the changes in farming practices, their numbers have dwindled.

**Shops and Services** Heritages was the main bakers and shop, Jacksons another. Mr Boycott was the butcher, Arthur Frost the coal merchant in Lower Tysoe, while Fred and Matty Parker ran the Post Office. Michael remembers buying four chews for 1d from Jackson's shop. There were two petrol pumps in Tysoe, one by the Methodist Chapel. Plastics were not widespread, so people used to recycle glass bottles.

**School** Michael started infants at the Village Hall, before moving to Tysoe School. He was milk monitor and stoker – putting coke in the fires in the classrooms. There was also an ink monitor. Some children gardened in the afternoons.

**Fire station and policeman** Both were features of Tysoe back in the day, but no more.

**A vibrant community** The Young Farmers Club (Calf Club) met weekly in the Village Hall. There was also a Youth Club and Sunday School at the Methodist Chapel. Michael reflected that Tysoe's sense of community has still survived notwithstanding the above changes.

### **TYSOE NOW**

The Record invited Jane Fellows, a relative newcomer to Tysoe, to contribute to this edition as she had commented on Michael's original Facebook post. We asked her what brought her here and how she finds living here. This is what she wrote:

After travelling, living and working abroad most of my adult life, I was a little unsure where to call home in the

UK, to settle down to old age! Then, out of the blue, Tysoe landed in my lap! Having no idea where Tysoe was and having never seen the property or the village, I Googled its location and knew I would love the village for the wonderful countryside that surrounded it.

How right I was!

When asked why I like living here I reflected on this question whilst walking through the fields on my daily dog walk. In the early spring sunshine the sound of the church clock chiming, looking around me at my beautiful surroundings, popping into the shop and Post Office for a few essentials to be greeted with a warm welcome by the staff, cutting through the churchyard with its rich history, passing the school where some children were playing football with a stone, stopping to chat to people I have come to know as friends, buying some fresh eggs from Michael Gibbs' farm, what's not to love?

The great community spirit that reaches out to give a helping hand and support when needed; a community that comes together for local events, like the Flower Show and bonfire night; a community that is hard to find in these trying times. And one that I am very proud to be able to call home now. We should treasure our wonderful community and through our actions, endeavour to strengthen it and count our blessings that we live in this village. Its beauty, tranquillity in many ways, its simplicity in a very troubled world.

Thank you TYSOE for giving me the chance to become part of this wonderful village, and hopefully be part of its future history.

### **KEEP LEARNING!**

### Is it just the young who learn? No, us old 'uns like to as well!

One way to do this is through the University of the Third Age (u3a) - a collection of charities that provide learning and social opportunities for retired people (their so-called "Third Age"). It allows retirees to embark on new adventures, expand their horizons, and continue to learn as individuals.

u3a offers a remarkable range of interests, events, visits, and activities that encourage members to enjoy later life through learning. This gives all members a great opportunity to explore new interests, gain personal growth, and connect with other people.

There are over 1,000 u3as with more than 430,000 members throughout the UK. Our nearest one is the Shipston on Stour Area u3a which started 10 years ago and now has over 350 members in an area roughly bounded by Moreton in Marsh, Ettington, Broadway, and Brailes. Currently, about a dozen of its members live in Tysoe.

Members are encouraged to follow a very broad range of interests. At Shipston, we have almost 40 'Interest Groups', each one with a leader to help learning by sharing knowledge, skills, and experience, and some Groups also learn from outside experts. Typically, individual groups attract around a dozen members.

As well as a monthly meeting for all members, which usually receives an external presentation, the Interest Groups range alphabetically from 'Allotment' to 'Wine Appreciation'. Groups include outdoor activities such as Walking, Gardening, and Nature, while many others are around indoor activities such as music (the Ukulele Group leader lives in Tysoe), languages, games, arts, crafts and literature.

Reading is such a popular activity that there are two Book Groups that meet monthly to discuss and critique the books chosen from a Book Group list at the local library.

The u3a is a wonderful way for people to embrace the joy of lifelong learning and you can see how and what they do on its website <u>www.u3asites.org.uk/shipston-on-stour/welcome</u>.

# HELIMED 53

This month Tysoe WI were visited by Dr Scott Castell, an emergency Doctor working with the Warwickshire and Northamptonshire Air Ambulance. Dr Castell told us that the Air Ambulance can expect to fly 1,800 missions per annum at a cost of £2,500 per mission flying two Augusta Westland 109 SP Helicopters that fly only during the hours of daylight.



The two regional air ambulances fly across the counties of Warwickshire, Northamptonshire, Derbyshire, Leicestershire and Rutland providing a rapid response to trauma and medical emergencies over an area of 3,850 square miles covering many of the UK's major road networks including the M1, M6, M69 and M42. With an average response of just 13 minutes, between them they attend on average six missions a day.

Like the helicopters, the Critical Care Cars, previously known as Night Cars, have highly trained medics on board who effectively bring emergency hospital care to the patient. Dr Castell told us that he can expect to attend a major trauma once every two days where he might have to perform open heart surgery, amputations etc. at the roadside or wherever the incident is.

Tysoe WI have been raising money for the Air Ambulance through the craft sales by our talented craft group and by our monthly raffles. We were delighted to be able to present two cheques totalling £2,000 to Dr Castell.

### END OF AN ERA FOR TYSOE'S BELL CAPTAIN

It is part of the natural rhythm of village life that people come and go but few leave their mark on a community to guite the same



extent as David Bell, who last month set off for a new life in Ripon with his wife Jackie.

David and Jackie had lived in Tysoe for 15 years, having arrived from Cumbria via London in 2009. Many will know him as the former head of Tysoe School and he has all the qualities you would wish in a teacher: a natural sense of justice, patience, a refusal to accept second best and a pride in everyone's achievements. They came in handy because David had another role in Tysoe, as tower captain of St Mary's Church.

Tower captains are responsible for promoting bellringing in their communities. David, a lifelong bellringer, quickly turned his attention to continuing the overhaul of the St Mary's bell tower and the standard of ringing. He introduced the same rigour into teaching a new cohort of learners as he would have in his classrooms. This continued even during the pandemic, when everyone met weekly online to practise using a bellringing app.

His name is a byword for excellence in bellringing circles but David's enduring legacy will be that he has managed to instil his passion in so many of us, inspiring us to stretch ourselves every time we step in the tower. It was an enormous privilege to have had him as a guide. Our wonderful bells are in good health and will continue to provide the soundtrack of village life, bringing us together at times of rejoicing or solemnity, as they have done for centuries. Thank you David. Tysoe was lucky to have you and we wish you and Jackie every happiness in the future.

### MAKING SPACE FOR NATURE - HEDGEROW HIGHLIGHTS



As they come alive this spring, our hedgerows have been in the news. These important habitats provide homes and highways for wildlife. In January, the UK Centre for Ecology and Hydrology (CEH) announced that they had mapped England's 390,000 km of field boundary hedgerows using aerial laser scanning (LIDAR). The map identifies sites for planting and restoration, linking up habitats and improving the hedgerow network. It can also help estimate the amount of carbon that hedgerows could store.

More recently, the government announced that regulations to continue to protect English hedgerows will be brought into law. Following BREXIT, the EU's land-based subsidies are being replaced with new farming schemes and this has left a potential 'gap' with regard to protection of hedgerows. Last summer, almost 9,000 people and organisations responded to a Defra consultation on hedgerows, and confirmed overwhelmingly how much hedgerows are valued. As before, the proposed regulations will require a 2-metre buffer strip, from the centre of the hedge, where no cultivation or application of pesticides or fertilisers must take place. The cutting of hedges between 1 March and 31 August will continue to be banned, protecting birds nesting during that period. Hedgerows are a dynamic habitat and ideally, they should be managed in a way that maintains their thick dense structure and allows them to produce blossom and fruit on second year wood. The People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) has some great resources on hedgerow management, including an App to assess their condition.

Roadside verges also provide excellent resources for wildlife. Regular mowing reduces their value in terms of habitat and food. Now is the time to consider whether a more relaxed approach to mowing would be feasible in areas where good visibility is not essential. There will be more about this in the next issue – with a focus on 'No Mow May'.

# PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE Hi Tysoe,



The Annual Tractor Run will take place on May 19th on the Recreation Ground. Councillors are looking at ways to prevent the grass verges from turning into areas of mud from vehicles parking on them. They are also awaiting data from the Traffic Group so that further discussions can go ahead to look at traffic calming measures.

The value of Tysoe's Neighbourhood Plan was also discussed as part of its relevancy to planning applications. It is now part of the County's Core Strategy and therefore, when a planning application is considered, not only by the Parish Council but also the Planning Officer, great consideration is given to what Tysoe residents said in their plan.

Councillors are looking to carry out remedial work on the car park at the Recreation Ground, in order to allow emergency vehicles to have greater access to the playing field. We are also contacting the County Council again to raise awareness of the blocked drains and potholes in and around the village.

As I hope you are all aware, the defibrillator on the wall of Tysoe's Children's Group has been replaced and is up and running. Tysoe's School Council have written to the Parish Council in support of their project to buy more defibs for the Village. Once delivered, we hope the children will help us to advertise their whereabouts to all residents.

With Helen Sayers as lead, Councillors have been working on an Emergency Plan, which, when completed, will be sent to all residents. Looking forward to Spring.
