## NORTHERN LIGHTS OVER TYSOE

The amazing photo on the front cover was taken by Craig Frick.

"I had heard that on Friday night 10th May, we would be able to see the Northern lights across Britain. I didn't really believe it until I looked out of the window at 22:30 and saw what looked like a purple and white haze in the night sky. To my shock, I realised that I was in fact seeing the Northern Lights. Even more surprising, I was able to see them with the naked eye.

I knew the perfect location to try and get some photos, so with a lot of excitement I left my home in Newbold on Stour and headed to Tysoe. I then eagerly hiked up to the top of Tysoe Windmill with the aid of a bright torch. The Northern Lights were less visible at the top of the hill, due to light pollution, although still visible with the naked eye.

I stayed at the windmill for a couple of hours experimenting with my camera settings and getting different results. At about 1:35am I captured this photo and was over the moon with the results. Tysoe Windmill is very special to me as this is where I first met, and later proposed, to my now fiancée.

I was using my Nikon D500 on a tripod with an 18-55mm kit lens. Photo was taken with a 2 second exposure. You can see more of my photography on Instagram @craigmfrick."

A few weeks ago, I went to see a performance of Water 'Taking the Waters', by David Fletcher, a local

author, performed by KADS (Kineton Amateur Dramatic Society). It tells the story of the transformation of the sleepy village of Learnington Priors into the successful spa town of Learnington Spa.

The second act focuses on the medical and political conflicts surrounding the cholera epidemic in the town in 1849. Interestingly there were lots of parallels with our own recent Covid epidemic in terms of conspiracy theories, quack remedies, public anxiety and the speed of government decision making (or lack of it!).

Act Two starts in a lecture hall. Ren Katz played the role of professor who was showing a picture of the molecular structure of a cholera bacteria to her students. It was John Snow who conducted the pioneering investigations on cholera epidemics in England and particularly in London in 1854 in which he demonstrated that contaminated water was the key source of the disease.

Today cholera is easily treated by the replacement of fluids and salts lost through diarrhoea, but untreated it is a killer and strikes very fast. It got me thinking about how much we owe to medical science. Consequently I invited Linda Leonard to tell us about the medical advances she has witnessed during her career, see page 9.

Further comparisons between then and now concern contaminated water, as we don't appear to have learnt our lessons and we are still heavily polluting our waterways. There are national campaigns to 'Clean it up' - as 'five times more fish are killed as sewage spills into the nation's rivers.' (The Times 20th May 2024). So it is reassuring to learn how Severn Trent is investing heavily in the Tysoe Sewage Treatment Works - see page 15.

We can all do our bit to help, read our 'Green Tips' on page 18. There is a citizen science project running to monitor pollution in the Stour and Avon, see: t.ly/BxFri While Rick Thompson is talking about his book *"A River Avon Year"* on Friday 26th July, Stratford upon Avon - for tickets, see Eventbrite: t.ly/X6zL It just goes to show clean water is vital to all life forms and we shouldn't take it for granted. ### MEDICAL ADVANCES

Less than 100 years ago, modern medicine was in its infancy with no

antibiotics, or vaccines and limited surgery. Ever since I began my training in the 1960s as a consultant in Geriatrics, advances in medicine have been truly remarkable. Huge advances have been made in diagnosis, treatment and management of disease which has revolutionised the way medicine is currently practised.

The advent of investigative techniques such as CAT and MRI scanners and endoscopy has dramatically increased our ability to diagnose disease, often at an earlier stage, when treatment can be more effective, and most investigations can be done as an outpatient.

Treatment, too, has advanced beyond belief. Surgical advances are truly mind-blowing. Even 60 years ago, the most adventurous surgery was renal transplants. Now we transplant kidneys, livers, hearts and lungs and have ceased to regard these achievements as remarkable. Even the insertion of stents for heart attacks are an everyday procedure!

Advances in medical treatment have also been unbelievable. Perhaps the most valuable of the drug improvements is the wide availability of large numbers of antibiotics. Even 60 years ago, they were only just beginning to be used routinely. Add to that the range of medications for high blood pressure, heart disease, diabetes and others and you begin to get an idea of the magnitude of recent advances. Not to mention, of course, the wealth of vaccinations and immunisations that help to prevent or minimise serious diseases. How much worse the outcome of Covid might have been without the advent of vaccines!

Management of disease has also advanced considerably in the last half century. So much more care is available in the community, enabling us to live a relatively normal life in the face of disease. It was only in 1967 that Dame Cicely Saunders began the Hospice movement for end of life care at St Christopher's in London.

Of course, there is so much more to be done, including work in neurological diseases and mental health. We may complain about the service available to us now but, because of medical advances, our expectations are so much higher. Perhaps we should be grateful that we are not living a century ago! ## WAR WITH WORDS IN UKRAINE

WORD from Ukraine's frontline is coming straight to our locality, as renowned poet Iryna Starovoyt talks candidly and passionately about how the Russian invasion has impacted her country's way of life and culture at a Shipston event June 4<sup>th</sup>

We'll hear about the impact of the invasion as well as readings from her evocative and moving poetry in English

translation. Iryna is currently a Visiting Professor at Oxford and has represented Ukraine at many major events across Europe. As she moves frequently between Ukraine and the UK, hers is very much the voice of the moment.

She will share how the Ukrainian people are fighting, not just for their land, but also for their society and traditions, with resilience and verse, captured in her poetry:

"You see, our wars don't happen in three days And people don't have two lives We don't need the legislation of amnesia On the contrary, we remember with tenacity Especially for the future"

Organised by the Shipston & District Literary Society, the event will take place at the Townsend Hall, Shipston, on **Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> June at 7.30 (doors open 6.45)** and will have music and a cash bar. Local businesses have been very generous with donations for our Grand Raffle which will be raising funds to buy books in Ukrainian for Ukrainian children in this country to help keep them in touch with their language and culture for when they are able to return home to rebuild their future.

## LET'S TALK ABOUT SEWAGE

The residents of Back Lane have witnessed some dramatic sights over the last few months as two rotating bio contactors (RBCs) or filters have been manoeuvred into the site. There is a third due soon. They are mighty impressive. During the wet winter and early months of this year, tonnes of spoil have been removed from the site and, following a site visit, the Record team can confirm that Galliford Try's compound is neat and tidy, despite the adverse weather conditions.

So why did Tysoe need a sewage works upgrade? The existing works had extended



treatment provided by reed beds but had no storm outfall. The new developments in Tysoe have separate not combined flows (i.e. foul water and surface water). It was failing to cope with increased demand to reduce nutrients like phosphate.

The cynical may say that it is to allow for more housing development, but there is no planned increase in treatment capacity. Severn Trent was coming under pressure from the Environment Agency to reduce the pollutants going into the Oxhill Beck, which ultimately drains into the Stour. There is a citizen science project monitoring the nutrient load on the Stour and Avon (t.ly/BxFri).

The RBCs will help to decrease the level of pollution, while the refurbished and replanted reed beds will absorb the nitrogen more effectively and potentially take up more phosphate. With state of the art telemetry the pollutants in the effluent should be closely controlled.

And so to the future, what can we expect? These new works represent a huge financial investment of about £5 million which will put Tysoe Sewage Treatment Works at the forefront of rural sewage! We can all do our bit and help too by following 'Green Tips' on page 16.

## GREEN TIPS. TO FLUSH OR NOT TO FLUSH, THAT IS THE QUESTION?

What we put down our lavatories is not considered a polite topic of conversation, but perhaps it should be. The rule of three Ps should apply; pee, poo and paper are the only things that we should flush away. Nappies, cotton pads, cotton buds, old medicines, sanitary items and wet wipes are some of the items

which unfortunately find their way into the sewage system often with dire consequences causing blockages and releasing microplastics into water courses and the sea. Wet wipes are worth a special mention, packages may have on them claims such as free from plastic or flushable. Until March of this year some packets of wipes bore the `Fine to Flush' label but this has now been stopped and has been replaced by the `Bin the Wipe' campaign. It is estimated that wipes contribute to over 300,000 sewage blockages each year. Finally consider what you use to clean your loo, try to avoid those cleaners which contain bleach and other toxic chemicals.





## THE SECRET TO A GOOD NIGHT'S SLEEP





On May 1st Dr Katy Bellamy came to talk to us about the neuroscience of sleep. Katy's top tips for a good night's sleep are:

- Try to go to bed and wake up at the same time each day.
- Don't take naps after 3:00pm.
- Have a cool, quiet and dark room.
- Avoid caffeine after noon. This includes "hidden caffeine" found in painkillers, fizzy drinks, certain teas e.g. green tea and chocolate.
- Exercise, particularly outdoors to get some natural sunlight exposure (good luck with that in our present weather conditions!).
- Finally, don't lie in bed awake. If after 20 minutes you find yourself still awake get up and do a relaxing activity such as reading a book or knitting until you feel the need to sleep.

## MAKING SPACE FOR NATURE - PLANT HEALTH

The week beginning 6th May was National Plant Health Week, which was to highlight the health of all plants in Great Britain - wild and Locally we've been affected recently by ash dieback cultivated. disease and many will remember the impact of Dutch elm disease on our landscape in the 1970s. In addition to feeding us, plants provide many other 'services', for example a mature evergreen tree can intercept more than 15,000 litres of water per year, helping to reduce the risk of flooding, and air pollutants are removed by trees and other plants. Last year, the Department for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) published the 'Plant Biosecurity Strategy for Great Britain (2023)' to set out a new vision for plant health: "To protect Great Britain's plants through a strong partnership of government, industry, and the public, working together to reduce and manage risks posed by plant pests and pathogens, and facilitate safe trade."

Plant Health Week was coordinated by **Plant Health Action** https:// planthealthaction.org/iyph-2020. The key messages promoted were as follows:

- LOOK OUT for signs of pests and diseases on local trees report these through 'TreeAlert' https://www.forestresearch.gov.uk/toolsand-resources/fthr/tree-alert/. This information supports tree health surveillance work, contributes to scientific research and helps to protect the nation's trees
- **'DON'T RISK IT!'** don't bring plant material (plants, trees, fruit and seeds) into the UK from abroad. These might be carrying harmful pests and diseases.
- BUY YOUR PLANTS AND TREES RESPONSIBLY source plants from reputable nurseries and suppliers. If you are buying plants online, buy from a UK-based supplier to reduce the risk of harmful pests and diseases entering the country.
- **KEEP IT CLEAN** by cleaning boots, bikes and buggies before visiting woodlands and parks, otherwise you could spread harmful organisms like fungi, bacteria and insects.

## THE SEASON OF GROWING

Last month ended with two great celebrations, Pentecost (or Whit Sunday) followed by Trinity Sunday. The season after Pentecost is known



in the church as "Ordinary Time" and the liturgical colour changes to green which symbolises the season of growing. June is low-key by comparison, until the end of the month when we celebrate St Peter and St Paul, without whose courage and dedication in spreading the gospel we might never have heard the Good News.

As I'm writing this in the middle of May there is blossom on the trees, beginning to set to produce fruit; we see sheep and their lambs in the fields around us; everything is growing and the now familiar yellow flowers of the oil seed rape are giving a patchwork pattern to our countryside. We tend to have an idyllic picture of farming and overlook the constant anxiety about the weather (especially with all the rain this year). We forget the physical toll it takes being out in all weathers, up at all hours milking, planting, ploughing, delivering, and often feeding, the lambs that bounce across the fields. Here we see the miracle of God's creation combined with an immense amount of work on the part of farmers and growers. The Farming Community Network (one of the charities we support) helps those that we take for granted, especially farmers who are struggling with the financial and personal costs. They are facing uncertain times, especially as our climate changes and the seasons don't seem to follow any predictable pattern. I was listening to Kaleb on Jeremy Clarkson's Farm. When asked why he does it he said, "It was in the blood, it wasn't a job, it was a way of life."

If we are asked why we are Christians, could we say "It is in the blood, it is our way of life"? In our season of growing pray for those from our churches who will be confirmed at St Peter's Church in Kineton on 9th June. Pray that for them it may become a way of life in which they will grow and in which they will help others to flourish.

### **WOT2GROW UPDATE**





A morning spent in the community orchard

always gives me time to appreciate anew what a wonderful place it is for people and wildlife alike. The trees and bushes are humming with insects while skylarks call in the neighbouring fields. Research shows that being close to nature and growing food contributes to our well-being in many ways, as well as supplying us with local, sustainable food.

So with these benefits in mind the prime purpose of the orchard is to produce food. And this it does in abundance. This month the blossom is setting on the fruit trees and lots of berries are already forming on the gooseberry and currant bushes. The raspberry canes have been cleared of weeds, as they were in danger of being swamped by goosegrass (cleavers), and some paths through the long grass and around the bases of the trees are soon to be cut, leaving the rest for pollinators (otherwise no fruit!) and other wildlife.

The membership fee of £25 until March next year includes fruit (such as apples, pears, cherries, plums, currants and raspberries) for the rest of the year. This supports the orchard to buy the equipment and resources needed for the effective maintenance of the orchard. Volunteering at the orchard is not a requirement of membership, but any time that you can give is always appreciated and is an opportunity to meet other members.

The orchard is next to the allotments on the Shenington Road in Tysoe.
