





FAREWELL FROM REVEREND HEATHER PARBURY

In February 2020 I retired from my posts of Rector and Dean in Berkshire, little knowing that 'coronavirus' would soon strike with Church leaders working all hours to respond to the pandemic.

We returned to Warwickshire and after talking with the Bishop and Archdeacon of Coventry and meeting Rev George and Drina suitably spaced in Tysoe vicarage garden, we came to live in Brailes vicarage to help out in the South Feldon Group of Churches as your non-stipendiary Associate Minister in these unprecedented times.

Despite the restrictions of Covid I soon got to know the faces of the many local people who met together for South Feldon zoom as more than 100 worshippers gathered twice weekly to enjoy music and singing, pictures, prayers, reflections and fellowship together from our own homes.

Then we were back in the church buildings, although with restrictions, and I was beginning to meet those who had not been able to worship together for the lockdown months. It has taken time to regain 'normal', and some are sad that life has not returned to what they remembered, or hoped for.

In our communities we have new ways to work from home, to shop and to enjoy time off. Many are grieving for friends no longer with us. Some are still fearful and find the changes to the community and culture around us difficult to navigate. Schools and churches as well as the health service are finding ways to work professionally with families and individuals whose lives and relationships were seriously disrupted

Now, four years on, I am moving on again. In recent months in our worship, and together as a group of parishes, we have been finding ways to count our blessings; to see where even now God is at work for good in our lives and villages; to ask where we too can be agents of change for the better.

For change happens wherever we are. Life and growth continue all around us. It may feel uncomfortable, and at times we might fight against developments we can't control, but God invites us to go with Him into a future that not only could bring surprises we could never foresee and challenges that we could not imagine but blessings we have not expected.

I have received precious blessings in my time with you, met many wonderful people and faced some interesting challenges in ministry too. Thank you to Rev George and Drina, and to all who gave us a warm welcome in difficult times. Thank you to those who have supported us in ministry here through prayer and loving service. I pray for God's continued blessing on all of you sharing the life of Christian Faith and worship in our churches and schools, and blessings on all who live in the villages.

Please do come and join us in St George's Brailes for my final service as your associate minister on September 1st. Everyone, of all ages, will be very welcome. It will be family friendly worship! Please stay to enjoy the tea party afterwards. I look forward to seeing many of you there.

MAKING SPACE FOR NATURE IN TYSOE

The wet spring has supported plenty of plant growth. The wildflower seeds sown a few years ago are starting to pay off and there are 'new' species in School



Lane and in the margins of the playing fields. The pink musk mallow (above) in the playing fields is particularly attractive and blue geraniums and scabious have appeared in School Lane. The plants in the 'triangle' at the junction of Sandpits and Oxhill Roads have also grown vigorously and are now being trimmed regularly. In contrast, it seems that the weather has had the opposite effect on insects, and, so far, it has been a very poor year for butterflies. On the facing page you will see a call for help with the development of Warwickshire's Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS), which will be Warwickshire's plan for supporting and improving biodiversity over the next few decades. It's important that as many people as possible provide their views through the consultation - which can be found using the QR code or this link: https://ask.warwickshire.gov.uk/bi/nature-recovery/.





Warwickshire's Local Nature Recovery Strategy



The Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) will be Warwickshire's plan for supporting and improving biodiversity over the next few decades.

It will be used to identify and prioritise many opportunities for nature improvements. These may be focused on particular areas, species or habitats.

48 LNRSs will be produced throughout England to link together to cover the whole country, forming part of a Nature Recovery Network.

Warwickshire's LNRS will be produced by Warwickshire County Council (the Responsible Authority), working with the Warwickshire, Coventry and Solihull Local Nature Partnership (LNP).

We need your help!

The Warwickshire, Coventry and Solihull LNP is coordinating a major consultation exercise to assess the state of nature in Warwickshire, and find out what people want to see in the LNRS.

You can take part in the consultation by completing an online survey about your thoughts on nature in your locality.

WOT2GROW UPDATE

What could be a better way to spend a sunny July morning than kneeling in the clover and looking for redcurrants? Their jewel-like colour makes them easy to spot – but also for the birds to find! Therefore they are safely enclosed in a fruit cage, which has to be regularly checked for gaps and tears in the netting. Even so, some birds still find their way in. These redcurrants are grown as free-standing bushes and need to be pruned each year to maintain their shape and to remove old and dead wood.

This summer there has been masses of soft fruit to enjoy. This is shared among members and the surplus donated to care homes in the area. Anyone living in the villages of Whatcote, Oxhill or Tysoe are welcome to join and enjoy this wonderful harvest.



The membership fee of £25 until March next year includes fruit for the rest of the year. The orchard is next to the allotments on the Shenington Road in Tysoe.

VILLAGE HALL NEWS

Another busy period for your Village Hall Committee since our last update. Those that have visited recently will have smelt the aroma of fresh paint. The McNulty



Room is now refreshed with a nod towards the hall's 1929 heritage. Many thanks to Steph and the team at Showhomes for their help in selecting the colour scheme and painting to their usual high standards.

The kitchen sub-group is grateful to regular users who provided valuable input on ideas that would update our food and drink preparation facilities. We are now focused on fund raising through grant applications and events to purchase and install those items that make the production of larger-scale catering more efficient.

Following a detailed energy audit and building inspection in July the hall hosted a Public Consultation where we presented an update on the volume of electricity the building consumes, the financial effect that has on cash reserves and of course hiring charges. Following a very positive public response the hall will now progress with a planning application to site solar (more accurately photovoltaic) panels on the South West (bungalow side) roof elevation, supplemented with internal battery storage. Projections are showing, even subject to the variable British weather, that we will make good inroads into the financial shortfall the increase in electricity costs has created. We hope to secure funding via external grants for this major capital project, to benefit the hall for the long term.

Events at your hall raise funds for reinvestment into our facilities. We are grateful to villagers who enjoy Film Club and have already bought ABBA and Michael Buble music night tickets, so do please come along and support this important village asset.

I'm sure you'll have fun!

GREEN TIPS. FOOD WRAPS

What do you use to wrap sandwiches and leftovers? For many of us the choice comes down to aluminium foil, often referred to as tin foil, or clingfilm. Traditional clingfilm contains plastic so



we might assume that aluminium foil is the better option. The production of aluminium foil starts with the mining of bauxite which is energy intensive and environmentally polluting, furthermore the production of aluminium requires vast amounts of electricity. Admittedly foil can be recycled but it would have to be used six times to offset the energy costs of its production. So cling film may be the better option or you could consider alternatives, many people use waxed cotton wraps or you can now buy compostable cling film made from corn starch which contains no micro plastics. I do remember my mother keeping the waxed paper wrappers from loaves of bread to wrap sandwiches, I suppose it was a case of waste not want not which is perhaps something we should all try to do.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

Help us keep Tysoe special!



Hi Tysoe,

Great news everyone! Cllr Amanda Venables was successful in a bid for Lottery funding to purchase 2 new defibrillators for Tysoe! The Parish Council received £3,950. This means there will soon be four defibrillators in the village. One at the Old Fire Station, one at the sports pavilion on the recreation ground and the other two will be housed in appropriate places so that they can be accessed by all.

The Tysoe Children's Group are hoping to upgrade their outside play area and equipment and have secured some funding which is fantastic. Tysoe's Parish Councillors have given their support to this project as they feel the group is a big asset to the Parish.

Further work has been carried out on the Children's Playground with more to follow. Some of the picnic tables have been damaged once again. This is sad to hear as they benefit so many visitors to the recreation ground.

Councillors have authorised the replacement of 3 streetlights in the parish that are not working, and hopefully there will be enough funds left in the budget to replace at least one or two more.

The Speedwatch Team have reported that surveys are being carried out around the Parish. Data received from these surveys will give a clear picture of the speed of motorists into, through and from the village and may help secure funds to help with traffic calming devices if it is felt they are necessary. WATCH YOUR SPEED!

Work begins shortly on overgrown hedges and fallen trees in Poolgate and where Church Farm Court meets Main Street. Councillors will also be organising work on trees in the village.

THE MAKING OF TYSOE: GRAVE TALES FROM THE CHURCHYARD (6) WHERE HAVE ALL THE GRAVESTONES GONE?

Graveyards have an inbuilt storage problem. Land is limited but burials continue. There have been several responses to this problem, some of them in evidence at St Mary's in Tysoe. The Tysoe Heritage Research Group survey has unearthed them forensically. The early cemetery was close to the west, south and east of the church. The slight bank on the left of the path from School Lane marks the edge of this early cemetery. The simplest solution to overcrowding is to use the same ground again—the "Alas, poor Yorick" solution. This inevitably unearths remnants of earlier interments. The storage of disturbed bones in "charnels" was common in medieval churches, in crypts or special vaults. The result of "stacking" burials is that the cemetery ground level rises, and one often descends into a medieval church from the raised graveyard level, as at St Mary's.

Adding more land is common, and again St Mary's shows this. We don't know when the extensions to the south and south east were added, but land was added to the north-west of the church in the early 19th century, and again to the north-east in late 19th century.

Another solution is to clear areas and start again. At St Mary's only the section between the path from School Lane and the church wall remains relatively undisturbed. The whole cemetery south of the medieval cross was cleared in 1970, and most of the stones stacked against the south west churchyard wall. At least 30 stones got "lost" in this process, although some have been traced to the churchyard wall along School Lane, some more to the paving at the Manor, and one in a wall in Peacock Lane. We know about these lost stones because they were recorded in surveys in 1910 and 1970. But we can reckon that hundreds of unrecorded historic Tysoe headstones have been re-purposed over the centuries. THRG has recorded only seven 17th-century headstones stones in Tysoe compared with Warmington's sixty undisturbed examples. Where are Tysoe's lost memorials? Is there one in paving or built into a wall near you?

My dad kept a considerable number of chickens in an orchard on Epwell Road for which he paid the princely sum of £1 per year rent to farmer Spencer Taylor. The chickens were housed in three largish coops to each of which Dad had fixed



substantial timber skids so they could be dragged and moved. The end of harvest would see a considerable activity in that orchard.

The field behind our house is known as the dairy ground in which Farmer Taylor kept a large carthorse. Dad was given permission to use the carthorse and after many expletives he eventually managed to capture said carthorse which was then harnessed up and attached to the chicken coops.

What followed was a latter day nomadic trek from the orchard to fields adjoining the Windmill. It must have been quite a sight, Dad leading carthorse, carthorse dragging chicken coops, myself with dog opening and closing gates and Mum bringing up the rear. On reaching the freshly harvested fields the chickens would feast joyfully on whatever grain had been left by the binder. I was charged with opening and closing the coops mornings and evenings.

This idyllic situation continued until the fields were due to be ploughed and thus the procedure would be reversed and the nomadic party would return to base and some form of normality.

I'll relate what I consider to be an amusing event relating to the foregoing. In Smarts Lane lived a lad called Freddie Grubb who was known locally as 'a bit of a lad'. Freddie visited Dad's chicken coops one morning, collected all the eggs, took them home, hard boiled them and returned them to the coops. Imagine Mum and Dad's surprise on using the eggs. Lads will be lads!
