TYSOE PARISH COUNCIL

It has been another busy year for your Council. In no particular order, these are the things that have occupied us this year:

- We have reviewed over 30 planning applications and saw off the application to build a large industrial gas plant in the parish.
- We have commented on the recent draft South Warwickshire Plan and held an open meeting in the village to explain the pertinent issues in the Plan.
- We have conducted traffic surveys at the entrances to the village in order to gather data to support traffic calming measures and to improve the safety of residents.
- We participated in the Hedgerow Heroes scheme with CPRE Warwickshire to re-lay the hedge on the playing field. Many thanks to CPRE and the volunteers who helped with this.
- We have carried out repairs and maintenance to the playground equipment to ensure the continued enjoyment and safety of children using the facility.
- An Emergency Plan has been compiled to ensure that we have a measure of protection should the village be faced with a major emergency. We will be publicising details of this in the coming months.
- We have installed two new defibrillators in the village and new cabinets for the existing units thanks to National Lottery funding. Three training sessions have been organised and we thank Shipston First Responders for their invaluable help and advice on this project.
- Our search for a suitable site for a small development of affordable homes has continued. We are committed to providing suitable accommodation for those residents with a strong Tysoe connection to be able to live in the village.
- We continue to support a number of village organisations with small financial grants and donations to ensure that the village can provide a varied, lively and caring network for residents.
- Finally, we have been able to keep the rise in the Parish Precept to 5% which means that for a Band D property the precept will be £67.89 compared with the Stratford-on-Avon District Council average of £84.13

All residents are welcome to join our meetings on the second Monday of each month in the Village Hall at 7.00pm. My thanks to all Councillors, who give their time voluntarily, and to our Clerk, Charmaine, who does such a wonderful job in keeping us in order.

COUNCILLOR MILLS

The leaders of the six District Councils in Warwickshire were invited to develop a joint submission proposing local government reorganisation in the county. An interim plan was required by 21 March 2025, with full proposals submitted to Government by 28 November 2025. Should the proposals for Unitary Authority be accepted, it will eventually result in the dismissal of all District and Borough Councils, bringing all Councils under one umbrella. There is a lot to do and therefore, a decision for a Unitary Authority may not be until 2027/28. There is no Public Consultation.

Summary - Warwickshire County Council is in a relatively good financial situation which enables us to make sure Social Care is a priority for our most vulnerable residents in Warwickshire. In England, devolution is the transfer of powers and funding from national to local government. It is important because it ensures that decisions are made closer to local people, communities and businesses.

Through a white paper the Government aims to establish devolution deals for all areas in England.

In March 2024 Warwickshire County Council became one of only four councils to secure a Level 2 Devolution Deal (the Deal). The Deal included the transfer of three key sets of functions and funds, covering the responsibility of allocating Adult Skills Fund delivering 19+ further education and skills provision from August 2026 onwards, the planning and delivery of the UK Shared Prosperity Fund from April 2025 onwards; and devolution of Homes England compulsory land assembly/purchase powers to be concurrently held with and exercisable by Homes England.

The Government has set out plans to move away from the current two-tier system of district and county councils in England. This is relevant to Warwickshire County Council and the five District and Borough councils in the county (Nuneaton and Bedworth, North Warwickshire, Rugby, Stratford District, and Warwick District).

The Government has indicated that this will mean creating councils with a population of 500,000 or more, but there may be exceptions to ensure new structures make sense for an area, including for devolution, and decisions will be on a case-by-case basis.

COUNCILLOR LITTLEWOOD

Stratford-on-Avon District Council (SDC) is responsible for the following services, including Social Housing, Planning Applications, Council Tax Collection on behalf of Warwickshire County Council, Waste Collection,

Environmental Health, Leisure Facilities, Parks & Open Spaces and Local Economic Development.

SDC owns a very small number of dwellings which are mainly used to reduce the cost of placing homeless families into B&B accommodation, but the Council works closely with the Housing Associations in order to place families into permanent rented accommodation as quickly as possible. Note that SDC does not have any statutory powers to force Housing Associations to house anybody but does work in close cooperation and provides lists of families on a waiting list through Home Choice Plus. In addition to Planning & Building Control, SDC's planning policies require a developer to include a mix of homes of varying sizes. Where developers decline to provide Social Housing mix on their sites SDC secures funding for Social Housing from developers through Section (S)106 contributions.

SDC is responsible for waste collection but not waste management which is the responsibility of the County Council. SDC do however own a share in a recycling company based in Coventry. This handles all of the District's recycled waste and receives a return on the joint investment with several other authorities through the sale of the processed material.

Under this Government's Local Government Reform described in the English Devolution White Paper (December 2024), the five District and Borough Councils will be merged with Warwickshire County Council (WCC) by the target date of 2028/29. This should create a single "Unitary Authority" which will assume the above responsibilities along with those of WCC. A recent review of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) has created a need for the current Planning Core Strategy to be reviewed and replaced before 2031. Consultations have been carried out and responses being assed with a view to report findings this summer.

As Member for Tysoe Ward, I try to work closely with all Parishes within the Ward and remain an open-minded contact for resident's issues and happy to help wherever I can.

COTSWOLD NATIONAL LANDSCAPE

Tysoe is a large parish with over 28 miles of footpaths and public rights of way, including 100 gates and stiles, 150 waymark posts and around 20 footbridges across streams and ditches.

The largest project that CNL volunteer work parties have carried out in the past year was to completely rebuild the flight of steps down from Tysoe windmill to Compton Wynyates lane.

Although this falls just over the boundary into Compton Wynyates parish this walk is enjoyed by many Tysoe residents and was becoming increasingly hazardous to use. This work was carried out over six weeks in November/December 2024.

Other work carried out includes the following work in the parish, in conjunction with Warwickshire CC:

- Centenary Way, from Sun Rising House to the Castle Inn, Edgehill. 9
 fallen trees removed and cleared along this path, which is now fully
 open for walkers from this spring
- Centenary Way path along Edgehill to King John's Lane, mowed and cleared last summer. There are plans this spring to replace several sections of rotted edge boarding this spring where path edge is steep
- Mowed and cleared the initial section of bridleway SS32 from Lower Tysoe Road to Lane End
- This spring there is a project to refresh yellow posts and update waymark arrow discs where they have become broken or faded
- CNL have also organised guided walks in conjunction with the National Trust, including several from Upton House car park along to the Castle Inn, Edgehill

Martin Smart has become CNL Parish Warden for the adjacent Compton Wynyates parish, and assists for Tysoe parish.

We have tackled some challenging music this year as we have improved in quality and we're now planning to provide a real treat for the audience at our Summer Concert on 28th June with a Les Miserable medley and a beautiful arrangement of a Billy Joel classic along with a variety of songs from several genres.

DEMENTIA CAFÉ / COMMUNITY HUB

Tysoe Friday morning dementia café ran every Friday morning through the year apart from two weeks at Christmas. Of the five cafés we run it is the smallest, not surprising though given the size of our village.

The biggest challenge is encouraging local people with dementia and their family carers to come and access the support and friendship that is available on their doorstep. Of the many reasons for this the most common is a perceived stigma associated with the condition. In our other locations we have a good working relationship with the GP surgeries and this two-way communication makes it much easier to encourage people to attend.

May was a busy month. We used Dementia Awareness week to put on four local roadshows in villages where we have no café – Brailes, Kineton & Ettington plus Wellesbourne where we ran one alongside our weekly café.

We also attended the Tractor Run as we were one of the benefiting organisations. it was a beautiful sunny day and the sight of so many assorted tractors was amazing!

In July we held our annual cream tea and Jazz fundraiser. Sadly the weather meant we were in the Village Hall rather than our garden, but it was no less enjoyable. Our second fundraising event was the Christmas craft fair and coffee morning at the end of November.

In August we hosted a second cream tea, as a "thank you" for our volunteers. The weather was beautiful, so we were in the garden this time. Across the cafes we have a team of 30 volunteers, without them the cafés would not be able to run.

We would welcome a few more volunteers in Tysoe, having lost a couple of our regulars, due to other commitments.

We would also like to record our thanks to Tysoe Parish Council for covering the cost of our rent and Bart in the local shop for assisting with the supplies of our refreshments.

THE FRIENDS OF SUN RISING

While the natural burial ground is run by David and Emma Restall Orr from Tysoe with their small team, working alongside them is the charity, The Friends of Sun Rising (FOSR). Registered with the Charity Commission (number 1181570), it has a board of trustees representing those with loved ones laid to rest and the local community.

The company manages the natural burial side and the nature reserve on a day-to-day basis, while the broad purpose of the charity is long-term: when there is no longer an income from burials and memorials, FOSR will take over its care, maintaining the site as a place of memorial and a haven for wildlife.

Last year FOSR held or supported nature walks, events focusing on grief, and fundraising events, including a local saxophone quartet and a Christmas fair. Our AGM, held in Tysoe Village Hall, was followed by a talk on The Birds of Sun Rising.

At many events, our stall sells local honey, jams, jellies, chutneys, greetings cards, tea towels and more. We support volunteer days such as mulching trees, raking hay, cleaning plaques and planting bulbs, and a regular once-a-month volunteer group who help out with seasonal tasks through the year.

This year there are a wide range of events, including many nature-oriented days, our Open Day (31 May), a watercolour painting day, an art auction, and our biennial Roll of Remembrance, when the names of all who are buried at Sun Rising are read aloud.

This year's AGM will be followed by a talk by Tysoe's Rosemary Collier OBE on making space for nature.

Sun Rising has about 350 subscribing Friends, an active mailing list of over 1500 recipients, an extensive website, Facebook and Instagram pages.

TYSOE CHILDREN'S GROUP

Tysoe Children's Group is open to all children between the ages of 18 months to 8 years, offering a range of year-round services to meet the needs of families in the local community and surrounding villages. As a childcare provider the charity works in partnership with families to provide the best possible educational experiences for all the children cared for.

Early years education is provided in line with the Early Years Foundation Stage statutory framework and Ofsted standards, ensuring that as an early years childcare provider the charity meets the learning, development and care of children from 18 months to 5 years of age across our two rooms.

The last year has been one of celebration, change and stabilisation. Tysoe Childrens Group celebrated the wonderful milestone of being operational for 20 years, first opening its doors in April 2004. The whole community were invited to an open day in July to celebrate with the staff and children. Our successful fundraising has enabled us to continue improving our setting and environment with the newly completed resurfacing of the playground.

There has also been change to the Government Early Years Funded hours, from April 2024 working parents of two year olds were able to request 15 hours of free childcare. Currently all requests for funded hours have been provided.

Like previous years there continues to be a focus on staff training, ensuring staff have the skills and knowledge required and were supported to carry out their job roles.

Increased numbers of children requiring greater levels of support remain and training reflected this. Members of staff are being supported through Level 2 and 3 Early Years Educator Apprenticeships, with 2 members of staff completing their apprenticeships and gaining qualifications.

TYSOE COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH

Safety on our Roads

The independent Tysoe Community Speedwatch (CSW) team supported by Residents, the Parish Council and officially by Warwickshire Police - is made up of volunteers who are concerned at the small number of drivers who do not drive within the speed limit or lower speeds that consider the risks on roads within Tysoe.

With a Primary School and Surgery at one end and a Nursery school at the other end, Main Street through the village has risks that require thoughtful adjustment of speed by drivers.

The formal assessment criteria are based on the marked speed limit.

Speeds are measured with equipment at approved points with safety notices posted. The equipment can monitor speed of traffic approaching and leaving the location.

The majority of monitoring points are in residential areas, the evidence of the need is demonstrated by the example of speeds on the Oxhill Road.

This stretch from Main Street, in the 30mph limited area, has been the subject of two formal traffic surveys as well as CSW sessions, where recently in an hour 10 vehicles out of 32 were travelling at speeds more than the limit, in past sessions even some up to 50/60 mph.

The information collated by the CSW team is sent to Warwickshire Police Road Safety team for verification and action.

TYSOE HERITAGE RESEARCH GROUP

Another active year was enjoyed by THRG whose purpose is to explore the origins and development of Tysoe and its people from prehistory to modern times. Membership of the Group is free and open to all and its research is posted on a dedicated website (www.tysoehistory.org.uk) which is continually supplemented. Anyone wishing to find out more should email thrg.@gmail.com

There is also THRG representation at village events such as the Flower Show and 'Made in Tysoe'. THRG is a Working Party of the Parish Council.

Over the past year the Group continued to pursue research across a number of fields. Some of the results appear in the Tysoe and District Record such as the regular series of Grave Tales from the Churchyard and a recent feature on early motor racing up Sunrising Hill.

Two additional broadsheets were published, one on the geology of the memorials in the Sandpits Road cemetery and the other on the obscure graffiti to be found inside St Mary's. Both are available in the church.

The Group was also active in the field and a programme of archaeological test pitting has commenced to trace the geographical extent of medieval Tysoe. Work also took place clearing and recording an early designed garden in the Parish.

Research continued into the way the Tysoe landscape changed over the centuries, particularly with regard to pre-inclosure times and in the origins of footpaths, driftways and roads.

Other projects include the role played by Tysoe during the Civil War, the preparation of a major book on Medieval Tysoe and a review of the Red Horse of Tysoe ahead of a series of public talks to take place on July 19th 2025 in the Village Hall.

TYSOE FOOTBALL CLUB

2024-25 has been another busy year of football for both the adult team and the eight Junior teams.

The adult team have had a very good season playing in the Banbury Lord Jersey League in division 1 and finished 3rd out of 10 teams, which is outstanding after finishing 4th last season in division 2. The adult team also had a good cup run but lost to Kings Sutton from the premiere division in the quarter final. Tysoe adults continue to attract new players, plus players from Tysoe Juniors are also becoming regular players within the team, this season we had over 40 players registered with the club.

The Juniors have had another good season with 8 teams this season with 2 U8, 2 U10, U11, U12, U13, U14.

To make it easier for pitch allocation and matches all the junior team now play their games in the Ambassador Evesham Football League on a Saturday morning with games at either 9.30am or llam so some Saturdays we can have 5 home games. It does mean a lot of travelling to Tewksbury and Pershore, but it helps the coaches and parents to know when all the fixtures are from September through to April.

This year we had 120 registered players to play in the above leagues.

The Juniors continues to grow and this season we had 8 Team Managers, 27 coaches, 21 FA Trained Team First Aiders and 31 parent helpers all of which have had a FA DBS check, all attended a FA Safeguarding course, and some have attended a FA First Aid Course.

We are also pleased to see that with the help of 3 parents all of which have had a FA DBS check, attended a FA Safeguarding course, and have attended a FA First Aid Course have offered to take on training a new group of younger players aged from 5–7 which started in March at the football Field on a Saturday morning from 9.30am. We have already had lots of interest with more than 15 children joining this group.

This season a new law came into the game meaning all age groups of U11 and below are now not allowed to head the ball, so players and coaches had to change the way they play or coach football.

Also, U7 – U9 had to learn the new rule of a kick in which replaced the throw in.

On Saturday 17th June the Juniors will celebrate their end of season annual football presentation with teams playing matches, a BBQ, and all players being given a medal from the club, plus each age group will award individual trophies to players for their achievements throughout the season.

The weekend of Saturday 21st and Sunday 22nd June Tysoe Adults and Tysoe Juniors will hold their annual Junior football tournament with approx. 60 teams taking part over the weekend.

Last season Tysoe Adults gained accreditation from the FA, and I am glad to say that this January Tysoe Juniors are now an accredited football club which is good for both clubs.

We could only achieve this with the hard work of both the Adult committee and the Junior committee and we are working more together with representatives on each committee and we plan to replace the kitchen in the pavilion next year with a grant now we are both accredited football clubs.

Tysoe Adults and Tysoe Juniors would like to thank the Parish Council for their continued support and Thomas Fox for maintaining the playing field which allows us to play football to a high standard.

TYSOE UTILITY ESTATE

The Estate, or Trust, goes back 470 years and was set up for the benefit of people in need within the Parish of Tysoe.

Over time, it has evolved, with the consent of the Charity Commissioners, to provide funding for a number of causes that are of benefit to the whole village, as well as its core purpose of education and helping the elderly.

A formal Constitution, reflecting a proper framework, was established on May 20th, 1862 and updated in 2000, to reflect its purpose in the 21st century.

Income distribution is derived from a number of assets owned by the Trust, including a farm smallholding, commercial and residential property and an investment portfolio.

It is operated by 10 elected Trustees, drawn from those who have lived in the parish for a requisite time, and who meet a minimum four times a year to both manage the assets and plan distribution of grants etc.

Over the years we have provided grants to many Tysoe organisations, including St. Mary's Church, Tysoe School, the Children's Group, the village hall, luncheon club etc. plus many individual residents.

In 2024, we distributed £10,710 in grants.

Any pensioner who has lived in the village for 7 years is entitled to a Christmas payment. A bereavement grant is likewise issued to help with funeral costs. Students going on to further education are entitled to a grant to assist with fees, books etc. Very rarely, a special discretionary grant is made in cases of acute undeserved hardship.

TYSOE VILLAGE HALL

2024 has been a busy year with both an increase in our hirers and our many fundraising events. Projects to improve the hall included refurbishments to the McNulty Room, upgrades to the audio visual equipment and decorating and repairs, both inside and out.

We have secured planning permission to install solar panels on the roof, as we want the hall warm and cosy but without the associated extortionate costs, whilst taking us further along our journey towards Net Zero. We wish to provide a community facility which is clean, comfortable and welcoming to all who use it.

We have embraced technology and our presence and activities, together with our hiring forms, are available to see on our website, on social media, by subscription to our email newsletter and in the Tysoe Record.

The Post Office, through Jacqui Franklin, kindly hosts the Village Hall Box Office for those that prefer to purchase tickets over the counter.

In addition to the main hall and raised stage, the building has a well-equipped kitchen, the McNulty Room, and accessible toilet facilities. It can therefore cater for a vast range of requirements, from children's parties to sporting events, meetings, theatre, craft sales and food provision.

The main weekly activities in 2025 are indoor bowls, pickleball, curling, table tennis, keep fit, yoga, pilates, Craft and Laugh and the Community Café.

The Parish Council, Lunch Club and WI also hold their monthly meetings here and there is a monthly Film Night, which is complemented by National Theatre live screenings – Tysoe being one of only 20 Village Halls licensed to do this, due to the high specification of our audio visual equipment, live theatre from a professional company, and occasional Opera screenings.

Including our regular and occasional hirers and through our fundraising events, many of which sell out very quickly, this hall receives over 10,000 visits per year.

TYSOE WILDLIFE

Tysoe Wildlife is an informal group of residents within the parish, supported by the Parish Council and Sy Mary's Church. A number of freely accessible areas are managed for wildlife within the parish, as well as several that are privately owned, such as Sun Rising.

They include St Mary's churchyard, the verge in School Lane, several of the margins around the playing fields and the triangle at the junction of Sandpits and Oxhill Roads. These are mainly managed for wildflowers, invertebrates and birds but some are also suitable habitats for small mammals.

Members of Tysoe Wildlife organise events and activities for residents, the most recent being a workshop for children in St Mary's Church prior to Christmas. The focus was on feeding wild birds during the winter.

Tysoe Wildlife belongs to the South Warwickshire Area Network for Wildlife (SWAN) and works with neighbouring communities to support wildlife and the natural environment. This includes future activities in Stratford, Shipston and neighbouring villages during Great Big Green Week from 7th-15th June.

At present we're focusing on 'No Mow May' and have just provided information to residents with a flyer in the Tysoe Record describing what individuals can do in their own gardens.

Some of the village verges are taking part in 'No Mow May' and outside the village there are spectacular displays of wildflowers on certain verges.

TYSOE WOMBLES

On 29 January 2025, the environmental charity 'Keep Britain Tidy' released a report on the alarming scale of the litter problems in England and the impact it is having on public health, the environment and economy.

The report found that 90% of urban and rural sites (1,140 miles) surveyed over the past decade contained litter. Just nine in every 100 locations in England are litter-free.

Tysoe and its surroundings is no exception. We have found litter in all Tysoe's public areas and along all its roads – with the heaviest littering on the busier routes leading into the village.

You name it and we've found it!

This April, a group of 29 enthusiastic volunteers came together to form a litter picking group called the 'Tysoe Wombles'.

This group is affiliated to the national Womble Community Groups charity. Tysoe Wombles has been actively supported by Tysoe Parish Council and Stratford District Council, which have either funded or loaned us litter picking equipment.

Womble volunteers have been allocated litter picking routes, which they pick at a time that suits them.

In addition, we are planning a bigger community litter picking event on Sunday 8th June, 1-4pm to celebrate 'World Environment Day' (5 June 2025). We will be meeting outside Tysoe Village Hall at 1pm, and ending with a rewarding cuppa and cake in St Mary's church at 3pm.

Help us keep Tysoe tidy. Become a Womble! No pick is too small, whether it's for 5-10 minutes or longer every couple of weeks, or joining a community litter picking session.


We promote our local community by hosting visits from other groups who are looking to set up their own community orchards.
